Dear Neighbors,

The autumn season here at the Salt Pond has been warm, clear and conducive to good golf. Our summer visitors have gone and we can now reclaim our roads.

When the Salt Pond Plaza was being constructed, we had an agreement with the developer that he would be responsible to pave the portions of Bethany Loop that the construction trucks utilized. Needless to say, the developer reneged on this agreement, but Harris Teeter stepped up to that commitment and contributed the \$50,000 needed to complete the repaving. Harris Teeter strives to be a good neighbor and community partner.

The club house and the golf course parking lots have been resealed and relined. Major projects for 2012 include replacing the roof on the club house and important renovations to the outdoor pool. Although both are costly, they are budgeted and anticipated expenses.

You will soon be receiving a copy of the 2012 Budget which the Board approved at the October meeting. Please review it and feel



free to ask for explanations and express your opinions. You may do that via our website, by email, or at the next board meeting. We will have a formal vote to approve the budget at the November meeting.

For this year, and for the foreseeable future, there will be **no increases in the annual assessment!** However, you should expect increases in the fees surrounding the trash and recycling portion. With the new Delaware laws, we now have mandatory recycling and yard waste pick-up. There is an increase over last year's trash only fee, and it will be reflected in the statement you will receive in December.

We wish you all a very happy holiday season.

Community Manager's Report



Recently, there have been a number of questions that have come up in connection with our Architectural Review Standards, so I thought it might be a good time to review the provisions that affect homeowners wanting to make any changes or renovations to their homes or townhomes. The standards also cover new home construction and those requirements are spelled out in considerable detail.

But for now, I am focusing primarily on the standards as they apply to external changes, additions, or significant renovations to the exterior of your home or yard. They do not apply to any changes or renovations to the interior of your house. And they do not apply for "like changes," such as repainting the exterior of your house the same color or replacing siding or some worn or defective part of the structure with the same type of material and in the same color.

The key to avoiding any problems down the road is to plan ahead. If you have any questions or are in doubt how to proceed or whether a contemplated change qualifies for filing an application, do not hesitate to call me at 302-539-1283, or email Donna Villani, Chairperson of the Architectural Review Committee, at villani@mchsi.com, for further information. Other members on the committee include Michael Headman, Phil Fleming, and Frank Pryal. Jim Beachboard serves as the Board of Directors liaison to the committee. While the committee does not hold regular meetings, they do act promptly to respond to questions or applications.

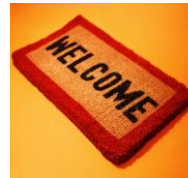
The architectural guidelines can be reviewed in their entirety on our website, sphamembers.org. That will give you a good idea of what you need to know with regard to making external changes and what documentation is required. The required application form also is on the website and that needs to be filled out and submitted along with a nonrefundable check for \$100 made out to ARC Salt Pond Homeowners Association. I also would be glad to send you the required form if you cannot access it electronically.

Failure to comply with our community standards by making changes without following the required provisions or not paying the fees does carry consequences and those are outlined in our

mitigation process which includes fines and ultimately, the temporary suspension of the recreation privileges for specified periods of time.

In another area, I just wanted to again remind homeowners to please remember to replace any burned out or broken exterior lights, especially front post lights. With the end of daylight savings, it is very dark in some areas of our community, particularly those stretches between streetlights where the front lights are the main source of light. Thanks for making this a winter priority.

SPHA Treasurer's Report



Profit & Loss Statement

The SPHA accounting system is based on accrual accounting guidelines. Therefore, revenues are booked on invoices issued, not assessment payments made. Based on the September 2011 financials, the SPHA billed revenues were \$720,606 Year-to-date (YTD). Most homeowners paid their assessment on time; however, a few homeowners still have not paid their 2011 assessments. The board is in contact with these homeowners.

Expenses are booked as incurred. Through September, after \$499,035 in expenses is subtracted and \$34,424 in other income is added, the YTD 2011 net income was \$255,995. The YTD budget is \$202,847; therefore there has been \$53,148 less in actual expenditures than the budget.

Through June \$189,003 was added to reserves and \$21,130 was expended.

Audit

The 2010 audit is completed and reflects that there was a \$71,625 balance of income over expenses. The Board approved transferring this amount into reserves. A final version of the 2010 audit is available on the web-site and in the SPHA Management Office.

2012 Reserve Study

The 2012 Reserve Study is completed. The Reserve Study is designed to forecast our community replacement costs over the next 20 years. The SPHA Engineering Committee, headed by Jim Beachboard, has done a thorough review of updating all planned expenditure estimates. Over \$1.7 Million in expenditures are planned for the next 20 years. The 2011-2030 Reserve Study is currently available for review in the Management Office and is posted on the web-site.

Salt Pond Golf Club

Golf Course Operations:

We have completed another successful summer season of Salt Pond golf. We expect to finish in the black again in 2011, but not quite at the levels we had budgeted. As you know, the hot summer weather and the August hurricane had a major financial impact. We have recovered slightly on a year-to-date basis, but we will not get back to budget levels. The current financials are presented by Chuck Gularson (below).

The regular fall course maintenance has been completed and the fairways, greens, and tee boxes are slowly coming back. A special thanks to Bruce DeForest and his staff for their hard work. We hope the course's beauty will be fully restored by spring.

Birdie's Snack Bar closed for the season in early October. The Board will be assessing the operation in November after the final income and expense figures are available. Pat Milstead and her staff, in their second full season of operation, did a great job providing inviting food and drink for players and the folks using the pool during the summer months.

The new committee structure that the Board instituted is working well. The Chairs of each of these committees are hard at work assessing current operations and preparing recommendations to improve them. My special thanks to: Al Preziosi – Merchandising, John Pieplow- Landscaping, Marilyn Adams – Tournament Planning & Marketing, Dick O'Leary – Ponds and Wetlands, and Suzanne Gularson – Email Program.

Our merchandising efforts for the Pro Shop are being improved. We post daily specials at the shop and soon regular email blasts will feature specials on Pro Shop merchandise that golfers and homeowners' alike may find interesting. Watch for the specials and come do some Christmas shopping!! Compare our prices and I think you will see a significant advantage for selection and quality.

We have completed a survey of four course ponds with the help of a consultant. We expect to begin remedial action to enhance the condition of these ponds as our budget permits. We will also plan extensive tree trimming and, in some cases, tree removal to improve the condition of the course and the cart paths.

The effort to get more tournament play at the Salt Pond is off and running. This effort should payoff in increased rounds of play which, in turn, increases revenue and profit.

The bulk head at the tee box on Hole #10 is being replaced. We hope to start replacement of course cart paths in the spring.

Every one of these projects should lead to increased revenue and profit. With increased revenue, we can continue to make needed upgrades to keep the course attractive to players and homeowners alike.

Financial Summary:



The golf club revenues through September were \$641,862.22, up from \$293,357.27 through the end of June. Operating revenues were \$628,112.05 with two categories, Membership at \$100,614.11 and Green/Cart Fees at \$427,729.40 accounting for the bulk of the operating revenue. Other income contributed another \$13,750.17. Actual expenses were \$596,633.67 compared to budgeted expenses of \$590,541.00, which is \$6,092.67 over budget. The summer revenues were good, but were negatively impacted by the hurricane and the heat. The 2011 plan was that the golf club would be positive \$155,814 in net income before depreciation thru September, but actually achieved a positive \$130,858.65 or \$24,955.35 less than the plan.

Roads: The golf club contributed \$100,000 in May/June toward the cost of repaving the roads.

Capital Improvements: There were several capital expenditures in 2011. These included 15 golf carts, two utility vehicles, a new mower, a greens roller, and a walk behind over seeder. There were also several capital improvements that have been or will be completed in 2011. These include installing a new bulk head at Hole #10, a wash pad and filtering equipment at the maintenance area, a new well, and making repairs to the cart path. The items were all included in the 5-year Capital Plan, which is updated annually to ensure there is sufficient cash to acquire capital equipment items when needed each year.

Detailed quarterly financial statements are posted on the web-site and the financial statements and capital improvement plan are available in the management office.

Landscape Committee Report



The lack of rain and the extreme heat took a toll on the landscaping around the Salt Pond this summer. The sprinkler systems were used more than in previous years. Also, because of the age of the sprinkler systems, several heads had to be replaced. The only things that seemed to grow were the weeds. The hurricane also came through causing a lot of tree debris around the neighborhood. Our landscape company, Lawnworks, came on Monday following the storm and began the cleanup. Within two days, all the common ground, vacant lots and Fred Hudson Road area had been cleared of debris. The fall mums are very colorful and should be beautiful through the fall months.

There are 40 lots that are being mowed by SPHA's landscaping company. The SPHA encourages everyone who owns an undeveloped lot requiring mowing to contract thru the SPHA to cut your grass. The assessment letter will include the cost for cutting lots; the letter will be mailed to owners in early December. Just pay for mowing along with your assessment and avoid the worry of having to get your own landscaper to cut the grass.

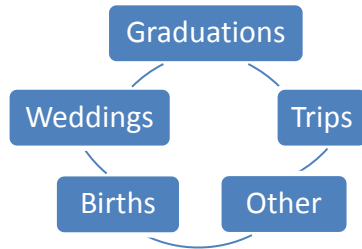

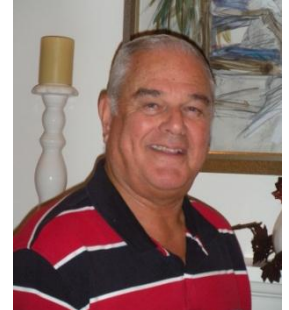

VOLUNTEER SHOWCASE



Ed Berger, and his wife Linda, had their home on Oyster Shell Cove built in 1995. They became fulltime residents after his retirement in 1997.

The Salt Pond developer selected 3 members of the community to serve on the initial Architectural Committee. Ed Berger was one of these first early members.



In 2001, the 7-member ARC committee was formed by SPHA. Ed was nominated as the inspector. He held that title until relinquishing these duties this year.

The original ARC guidelines have been modified a few times. Ed was instrumental in making recommendations to clarify and/or improve our current guidelines.

Many may remember Ed taking his weekly walks inspecting the houses under construction. In the early years the committee often met at least once per month to review 4 to 5 new homes at each meeting. Often, several homes were under construction at once, and Ed was the contact person for construction violations. We all know that Ed is an avid football fan. There were many a Sunday afternoon that he would get a report of a contractor working and he would make a visit (and miss part of his football game) to inform that person of our rules, and ensure that they vacated the site.



At the completion of a home's construction, Ed conducted the inspections to release the "security deposit" for satisfactorily completing the home as submitted.

Ed always took a personal interest in yard maintenance and made weekly inspections early in the season to make sure all residences had secured a cutting service or were taking care of their yards. He helped absentee owner's contract for services required. The community has maintained a manicured appearance due in part to Ed's diligence and non-stop inspections.

We thank you, Ed, for your years of service to the community and for being instrumental in creating the outstanding reputation and standards our community currently holds.

The Salt Pond has a committee that is monitoring the developments of this project and report regularly to the Board of Directors.

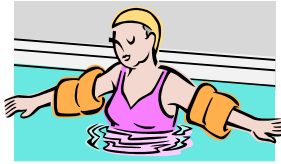
